TEACHING SOCIAL STUDIES PRESCHOOL - 8 INTEGRATED CURRICULUM UNIT RESEARCH PAPER GUIDE Dr. Ava L. McCall

The **purpose** of the research paper is to explain the social studies content you plan to teach within your integrated social studies unit and to express why you think this topic is important for students' learning. This paper should be <u>a minimum of eight pages</u> in length and will be worth fifteen points.

The first page should contain the <u>definition of your topic and important concepts and ideas</u> connected to the topic. Define any vocabulary words in student-friendly language.

The second and third pages should contain the <u>rationale</u>. Explain the central focus and purpose for the content you plan to teach in one or two sentences. Briefly describe overall what you want your students to gain from your unit and why it is important for their growth and development. Explain which school district benchmarks your unit is addressing and how these benchmarks are connected to the central focus and purpose for the content of your unit. Elaborate on how the benchmarks will help your students learn important social studies facts, concepts, and interpretations, and develop skills in interpreting, analyzing, and making arguments about important social studies ideas.

The next four to six pages should contain the explanation of the content of the unit. Select two or three main subtopics which align with the school district's benchmarks. Create a main heading for each subtopic. For example, in a unit focusing on the question "what do we need to survive," one subtopic is explaining the difference between wants and needs, how they can vary according to individual situations, and the importance of the reasoning process in classifying goods and services as wants or needs. Another subtopic is explaining what goods are and which goods are things we need to live and which are goods we would like to have, but do not need. A third subtopic is explaining what services are and which are crucial for life and which are nice to have, but are not necessary. For each of these subtopics, summarize the main ideas and supporting details and cite the resources used for content within the text using the APA format. Be sure to use <u>reliable sources</u>. Reliable sources include published books and articles by reputable publishers and journals. They should be written by credible authors, include current research, be thorough in explanation of the topic, and balanced in providing different points of view. Avoid self-published websites, blogs, and newsletters. A minimum of two pages should be written about each subtheme. Keep your focus on the content you are dealing with in the unit, not activities. This is the most important part of the paper and should be very complete.

The final page should include a <u>list of resources</u> you used in explaining the content of your unit, listed in alphabetical order by author. Thoroughly explained all content subtopics with main concepts, ideas, and interpretations, and supporting facts. Used reliable sources, cited them accurately in the body of the paper, and created an accurate, complete resource list using the APA style.
